Mandela Day Symposium



The Institute and the Seychelles Prison Service organised a half-day symposium at UniSey on Friday 21st August 2020 to discuss about crime and punishment. The event which was moderated by Dr. Erna Athanasius, was held to celebrate this year's Nelson Mandela International Day.

Crime is a worry for all societies. It is a worry because it is a threat for the rest of us. And it is a worry because the criminals themselves are wasting their lives. But what to do about it? In an ideal society there would be no crime. But, sadly, there is

no such place and we have to deal with it.

The question is how best to do this. If we get it wrong, prisoners will be locked up for a term and return to society – until the next time. But if we get it right there is hope that they can be rehabilitated to become good members of their community. The Mandela Day Symposium brought together experts from different fields to wrestle with the problem.
