

IN THE NEWS

A Diplomatic Academy for the Seychelles foreign services

Professor Claas Knoop, from the Senior Experten Service - Foundation of German Industry for International Cooperation came for a one-month assignment to UniSey from 18th May to 15th June 2019. During his assignment, Prof. Knoop drafted a proposal for the setting up of the Diplomatic Academy for the Seychelles foreign services. The proposal and recommendations were presented to the Department of Foreign Affairs (DFA) and the UniSey management. This was a very fulfilling assignment and a step forward in developing the Academy.



Seychelles begins its truth and reconciliation process



A Truth, Reconciliation and National Unity Commission was set up to investigate the various complaints of alleged human rights violations committed in relation to the 1977 coup d'etat in Seychelles. The purpose of this investigation is to establish the truth about those allegations in attempt to bridge the divisions caused by those violations; as well as to make recommendations regarding compensations and reparations to victims.

The Institute continues with its ongoing research on the reconciliation process in Seychelles and is closely following the Commission's hearing sessions. We hope that the Commission can achieve its objectives and be able to bring closure to victims and perpetrators and unite the people of Seychelles.

Strengthening ties with an international partner



In October 2019, UniSey and the Durban University of Technology (DUT) in South A frica strengthened ties through the signing of a Memorandum of Understanding. The purpose of the agreement is to collaborate in the furtherance of international higher education and research. It is designed to support the provision of a Master's degree programme in Peace Studies with law at the University of Seychelles.



Engaging the youth in peacebuilding

In line with one of the Institute's mission to promote the engagement of youth in peacebuilding, the Institute has partnered with the Anse Royale Youth Hostel to set up a Youth Peace Club. Thirty youths have already registered to become members of the Club and are already engaged in peace-related activities. The youth also participated in the 2019 International Day of Peace activities.

Remembering Rwanda: the enduring pain of genocide











The twentieth century will be recalled for many things, good as well as bad. But amongst the most horrific events was the incidence of acts of genocide. Given the record of human progress on so many other fronts, the mass killing of one group of people by another defies understanding. Just when we might have thought that human evolution had advanced beyond the primeval, successive catastrophes proved the optimists wrong.



"NEVER AGAIN" should not be a slogan but a reality! One such commemoration is the annual remembrance of the Rwandan genocide. The Institute organised the 25th anniversary of the of the 1994 Rwanda genocide against the Tutsi in an event on Tuesday 16th April 2019. A programme was prepared to honour the victims, to support the survivors and to see what we can learn from a terrible episode in African history. The special invited guests at the ceremony were the United Nations (UN) Resident Coordinator for Seychelles and Mauritius, Ms Christine Umutoni and the other members of the UN regional country team.

International day of peace: climate action for peace

Each year the International Day of Peace is observed around the world on 21 September. The General Assembly has declared this as a day devoted to strengthening the ideals of peace, both within and among all nations and peoples. This year's theme was "Climate Action for Peace" and it draws attention to the importance of combatting climate change as a way to protect and promote peace throughout the world.







The International Day of Peace Committee organised a series of activities to celebrate this year's event including a peace marches, peace shows and a climate action fair. The activities took place on Mahé, Praslin and La Dique and saw the participation of over 300 people.

Modern diplomacy and international law workshop

A workshop was conducted by Prof. Claas Knoop on Wednesday 12th June 2019 at UniSey (Anse Royale campus) to provide an introduction to modern bilateral and multilateral diplomacy. At the end of the workshop, the participants were able to explain the tools and the role of diplomacy in international relations. The workshop enabled the participants to understand the relevance of international law for Peace and Security in our world.

Unveiling of the late Sir James Mancham's statue



Two years after the passing of the late Sir James Mancham, the country honoured its founding president with a statue that was unveiled on 30th May at the Peace Park in Victoria. Present at the ceremony was Lady Catherine Mancham and Mr Alexander Mancham. The bronze statue represents the contributions which the late Sir James made in promoting reconciliation and national unity.

OVERSEAS MISSIONS

CNA Washington Multinational Conference on China and the Indian Ocean

CNA Washington, an American think tank specialising in naval intelligence but also with an interest in generic policy-making, invited Emeritus Professor Dennis Hardy on behalf of the Institute to a Multinational Conference on China and the Indian Ocean. Prof. Hardy presented a paper on 'Seychelles and China: a small island state in a global sea' that analysed how Seychelles is affected by the increasing presence of China in the region. The conference was held in Arlington, Virginia from 17th and 18th June 2019 and it was attended by some 50 to 60 delegates. As well as representatives from various countries in the Indian Ocean region, delegates included researchers from CNA Washington. The host researchers comprised a mixture of very bright analysts, combined with the experience of retired admirals and other senior personnel from the armed forces.

African diplomatic academies, universities and research institutes

A forum for African Diplomacy was held from 19th to 20th March 2019 in Pretoria, South Africa. The theme for this year's conference was "African Diplomacy in a State of Complex Global Uncertainty: Critical Threats, Leveraging Opportunities and Meeting Challenges through African Solutions". Present at the conference were heads of Diplomatic academies and institutes across Africa and Ms Diana Benoit represented the Institute. During the forum most participants signed the Memorandum of Agreement (MoA) for the establishment of a forum for African diplomacy for African diplomatic academies and research institutions. The objective of the agreement is to create a framework for closer cooperation among the African Diplomatic Academies and Research Institutions and to facilitate collaboration among the institutions.
